## OWLS HITTING THEIR STRIDE AFTER SLOW START

### YOUNG TEAM GAINING EXPERIENCE QUICKLY

After a slow start to the 2010 – 2011 season, the Slinger Owls have shown significant improvement in all aspects of the game. With only three seniors on this year's team, a bit of inexperience showed in the first four games of the season. The Owls have relied on good depth, with ten players seeing action in almost every game, to keep themselves in games in which they have gotten off to a slow start.

Slinger opened the season at Kewaskum on Friday, November 26<sup>th</sup>. The game was supposed to be part of the Scenic Moraine Thanksgiving Tournament, but Grafton backed out as they had scheduled different games for that weekend. Thus, Slinger played a single game at Mayville on Monday, December 6<sup>th</sup>.

The Owls displayed sloppy play most of the night. The game was close, with the Owls trailing 23 – 22 at halftime, until Kewaskum opened up a 37 – 29 lead at the end of the third quarter. Slinger could get no closer than seven the rest of the way as they fell to Kewaskum for the first time since 2001 by the score of 61 – 48.

The Owls shooting woes continued in their next game at Pewaukee. The Pirates came out on fire hitting nine 3-point shots in the first half to blow the game open early and taking a 42 – 23 lead into the halftime break. Slinger showed some life in the second half, battling to cut the lead to ten points at one juncture, but the deficit was far too large to overcome as Pewaukee closed out the 61 – 44 game. Senior guard Dan Wimmer paced the Owls with 11 points, while junior forward Dan Sabin contributed 10 points for the Owls.

The continued inexperience, especially on the defensive end of the floor, also showed in the first quarter of the rescheduled Mayville game. The Owls led by the score of 18 – 17 at the end of the first quarter. An early second quarter run got the Owls rolling for the rest of the night, as they jumped

out to a 34 – 24 halftime lead, extended the lead to 58 – 40 at the end of the third quarter, on the way to closing out the 75 – 48 victory. Sophomore guard Derek Merkes and junior guard Kirk Emmer paced the Owls with 17 points each.

After dealing with a couple tragedies in the Slinger community during the week of December 6<sup>th</sup>, the Owls had to travel to Hartford to play the Orioles in the conference opener on Friday, December 10<sup>th</sup>. The Owls battled hard all night, but could not get many shots to fall all night. Hartford jumped out to a 30 – 18 halftime lead. Slinger cut the lead to three points in the fourth quarter, but could get no closer as they fell 60 – 52. Junior guard Kirk Emmer led the Owls in scoring with 19 points, while senior forward Kyle Behrens added 17 points to the cause.

The overall quality of play took a turn for the better as the Owls finally played their home opener, hosting conference foe Watertown, on Friday night, December 10<sup>th</sup>. In a see saw game, which was well played by both team all night, the Owls opened up a 44 – 40 lead at the end of the third quarter. Watertown pulled the game to even at 53 all in the final two minutes. The Owls were able to hold the ball for the final shot. On a side out-of-bounds play, Kirk Emmer split two defenders driving to the basket then dished to Dan Sabin who made the layup and was fouled. Sabin hit the free throw, then the Owls stole the desperation in bound pass to pick up a critical 56 – 53 conference win. Sabin led the Owls with 13 points, while Merkes contributed 11.

The Owls improved play has continued since that game with Slinger picking up a nonconference 49 – 45 win against Sheboygan Falls, a dominating 54 – 31 home conference win against West Bend West, and then a 55 – 35 home nonconference win against Greendale right before Christmas. Those wins improved the Owls' record to 5-3 overall, and 2-1 in conference heading up to the Green Bay Holiday Classic to play two nonconference games.

Each year I am not really sure what to expect from my team. This year has been no different.
